Neighbourhood Watch

Neighbourhood Watch has been in operation since 1982 and is a recognised and successful crime fighting initiative.

The main idea behind Neighbourhood Watch is a simple one – community spirit cuts crime.

Neighbourhood Watch is not about being nosey or gossiping, it is about developing local knowledge, building community spirit and developing links with your local policing team.

What are the benefits of being in a Neighbourhood Watch?

There are many benefits to being involved in Neighbourhood Watch. Research by insurance companies shows that residents in neighbourhood Watch areas are less likely to be victims of burglary - that's why they often offer discounts on policies if you are covered by Neighbourhood Watch.

Watches are also in regular contact with the local police so minor problems can be dealt with before they develop further. By being part of an active community you will help deter the criminals. Your Watch will also get street signs installed which helps send out the message that the community is working together to prevent crime.

What would be expected of me as a member?

We would not expect too much from you as a member of a Watch but would expect you to review your home security, property mark all your possessions and keep an eye out, and report any suspicious activity in your area, but you can be more involved if you wish

What is expected of me if I were a Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinator?

As a co-ordinator you are the 'link' between your community, the local police teams and the Neighbourhood Watch manager.

Being a co-ordinator will not take up a lot of your time, the role is what you make it. We will send you information on local crime issues as well as crime prevention tips.

You will have the support of your local policing team, the Neighbourhood Watch manager and Merton Borough Neighbourhood Watch association.

I would like to be involved what is the next step?

When an individual or group wishes to start a Neighbourhood Watch we will help you to carry out a cavass of your neighbourhood. This can be done with the help and support of your dedicated ward officer. All new watches will be offered a launch meeting. All new members receive a members pack and street signs are erected.
